Assign Lesson 9: "Using a Map Key"

Read and discuss Lesson 10: George Washington.

It is important in this day and age when there are no heroes being presented in the schools, and when even George Washington is being criticized, that we stand strong and point out the religious faith of our leaders and the men who fought to make America free.

Study the three photographs. You can find many more photographs on the Internet. Locate a good [not critical] book about George Washington in the library, or look in the encyclopedia.

Your child might be interested in one of the famous battles of the Revolutionary War, such as the Battle of Saratoga.

Historians consider the Battle of Saratoga to be the major turning point of the American Revolution. This battle proved to the world that the fledgling American army was an effective fighting force capable of defeating the highly trained British forces in a major confrontation. As a result of this successful battle, the European powers, particularly the French, took interest in the cause of the Americans and began to support them. [From ROTC military website]
