

Straight Line Design: Using wide brushes and contrasting colors, paint only straight lines, parallel. Have you seen wallpaper straight-line designs? The straight lines of the local church can be studied and drawn in dark pencil. What kinds of shapes can be found inside the Church?

WEEK TWENTY-TWO

Art 3 for Young Catholics. Sand Picture.

Using graph paper: large letters can be drawn within the squares, about five squares high. These could be done with crayons or colored pencils. Letters could spell the names of Jesus, Mary, St. Rose, the rosary, or the Sacred Heart.

WEEK TWENTY-THREE

Art 3 for Young Catholics. Icon.

Lent: Read the story of Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey. Jesus chose a little donkey rather than a famous or strong horse to carry the King of Kings. Model a humble little donkey out of clay.

WEEK TWENTY-FOUR

Art 3 for Young Catholics. Icon continued.

The Last Supper: Paint a picture of Jesus changing the Bread and Wine at the Last Supper into His Body and Blood. Start with a simple line drawing at first and then fill it with colors, such as gold to color the chalice.

WEEK TWENTY-FIVE

Art 3 for Young Catholics. Pottery Painting.

The Angels: Angels always adore God, in Heaven and on Earth. Study a picture of a monstrance in which Jesus is placed (perhaps you have seen one in church at Benediction). With your gold crayon, draw a big monstrance with little angel faces with blue wings all around adoring Him.

WEEK TWENTY-SIX

Art 3 for Young Catholics. Shirt Design.

Baptism: Many people are studying their catechism in preparation to be baptized at Easter. Have your child attend a Baptism. Draw and color a picture of a Baptism or a Baptismal font.

WEEK TWENTY-SEVEN

Art 3 for Young Catholics. Calligraphy.

Easter Cards: Easter cards could be made for friends or grandparents. Fold a piece of paper in half. Paint or crayon events of the Easter story: The Angel at the tomb, Jesus Risen, Mary Magdalen talking to Jesus, Peter looking into the empty tomb.
