WEEK ONE

Day 1

For the first two weeks of this course, you will be studying the Introduction to English 11 and the English 11 Handbook. Understanding these is critical for success in this course. The Introduction is found at the beginning of the course manual and the Handbook is found at the end. Take today to read over the Introduction to English 11 and the Dedication for this course, as well as skim through the whole course manual.

Day 2

Over the next few days, you will be studying the English 11 Handbook. Study it carefully and remember to refer back to it as needed when you are working on assignments for English 11. Note that because the answers to the quiz questions are so clearly outlined in the Handbook, there is no separate answer key for Weeks One and Two.

Today, flip back to I. Requirements for Writing Interpretive Essays in the English 11 Handbook and study carefully A: What Distinguishes an Interpretive Essay. **The information on interpretive essays in the handbook is essential to your success in writing interpretive essays. You will be held responsible for knowing this material.**

WEEK THREE

Day 1

The first literature assignment is Nathaniel Hawthorne's *The Scarlet Letter*. The Dover Thrift Study Edition contains summaries and commentaries at the back of the text. The summaries may be helpful in understanding what is going on, but the commentaries are NOT meant to take the place of a careful reading of the book or of your own original thinking on the book. Interpretive essays and test answers which are mere paraphrases of these commentaries will receive low grades. You should read the summary on each chapter only after you have read the chapter and thought about it on your own, bearing in mind that the text itself and the Seton Lesson Plans and answer keys should serve as your primary sources for understanding the book.

After each assignment take a brief content quiz, closed book. Note that there are a total of 50 questions in the 8 quizzes. Each question is worth 2 points in the total grade which should be put on the First Quarter Report form on the blank line for "*The Scarlet Letter* quizzes."

Read Chapters 1 to 3. ("Custom House" is optional.)
