

Day 1

You can check off work as you complete it!



Look over the *English 4 for Young Catholics* workbook with your child. Note the title, author, and publisher. Read the copyright date and information on the back of the title page. Read about the front cover and look at the back cover. Read the Dedication.



Skim over the table of contents.

Notice what this course is covering. The illustrations in the workbook are the work of the late Mr. Patrick Diemer, who was a talented and award-winning artist on the Seton staff. (Please remember to pray for his soul.) Note the Reference found in the back of the workbook. Please encourage your child to use this section for quick reference of grammar terms and rules.



Read with your child the **Preface** and the **Introduction**. The Introduction introduces the story of the English martyrs, which is the theme of this workbook.



Read the outline of Chapter 1, p. 1.



Read **Lesson 1**, p. 3. The blue shaded box on each page contains the main idea(s) of the lesson. These ideas need to be memorized.



Assign **Exercise 1A**. This is the beginning of the story about St. Edmund Campion and the English martyrs. Your child may enjoy coloring the drawing of St. Edmund Campion on p. 2.





Paragraph Assignment:

Review the eight steps for writing a good paragraph in Lesson 17.

This paragraph is a description of a person.

Today, complete Steps 1, 2, 3, and 4 for writing a paragraph.

STEP 1

Choose one of the following topics:

- A baby that you know
- One of your grandparents

STEP 2

Write a list or a draw a web of items about the topic. The purpose of the paragraph is to create a clear picture for the reader of the person being described. Think about words to describe the physical appearance, what the person likes to do, how he/she acts/ laughs/ smiles, or how he/she reacts to other people.

STEP 3

Choose three or four items from the list or web.

STEP 4

Put the items into an outline.



Paragraph Assignment:

Continue writing the description paragraph and complete Steps 5, 6, 7, and 8.

RECALL THE RULES FOR USING PERSONAL PRONOUNS I OR WE IN PARAGRAPH WRITING:

- The topics of the paragraph assignments in this English course are personal experiences, personal observations, or personal reasons. Your child may use the personal pronouns *I* or *we* in his paragraphs.
- In formal writing assignments, such as book reports and research reports, the pronouns *I*, *we*, or *you* should not be used. Instead, use the personal pronouns *he*, *she*, *it*, or *they*.

STEP 5

Write an interesting beginning sentence about the topic.

STEP 6

Write middle sentences to develop the topic. Write a middle sentence about each point in the outline.

STEP 7

Write an ending sentence. Review Lesson 13 about the kinds of ending sentences.

STEP 8

Give the paragraph an interesting title.



When the first draft of the paragraph is finished, it is time to "polish" the paragraph.

Use connecting words between sentences. Add descriptive adjectives to help the reader create a picture of the person you are describing.



Once these changes have been made, your child should **rewrite the paragraph in a notebook or on a computer.**
