



- 1. Does the paragraph follow your outline?
- 2. Does the paragraph develop a single topic?
- 3. Is the beginning sentence a good topic sentence, clearly stating the topic and giving a hint about one aspect of the topic which the paragraph will be about?
- 4. Does every middle sentence provide a persuasive proven fact or example that supports the topic or beginning sentence?
- 5. Are the sentences in the paragraph written in a logical order?
- 6. Does the ending sentence give the paragraph a summary or a personal comment?


